Hong Kong - 1 new airport, 4 new cigar outlets! by Sung Ho Cheung

If you happened to be travelling to or passing through Hong Kong's brand new airport at Chek Lap Kok and found yourself with a couple of hours to spare and you fancied a puff, you might try any one of these *recent arrivals* to Hong Kong's growing cigar scene...

Cigar Dominicano - is a smart little cigar store located a little off the beaten track, almost opposite the front entrance of The Garden Hotel in Tsimshatsui East. (pronounced Chim-Shah-Choi East or in short, TST East). It has been open for about 9 months now. They have another store in Macau. If you plan to stay at any one of the tourist hotels in this area, then it's convenient. But if you're just passing through, it can be a bit of an ordeal to locate. However, if you're determined to check it out, it's worth the effort. There is, as the name suggests a (seemingly) contrived marketing strategy to convince shoppers to switch/buy/try Dominican-made brands. Amongst the selection of Dominican brands that were available, the *Ashton* brand appeared to be the most attractive and familiar brand carried.

If you're seeking a peaceful smoke at a reasonable price (for Hong Kong) in a quiet location in the company of some very charming staff members - then this is a place for you.

Swanky Smoke - is located in *The Lee Gardens*, one of the swankiest shopping malls in Causeway Bay, on Hong Kong Island. It's neighbours include Cartier, Chanel, Mercedes Benz etc. and despite being in such august company, there's not a hint of snootiness to be found in the Swanky Smoke cigar store. How refreshing!

The store itself is of a good size and once through the looking-glass doors, it's an airy and comfortable sort of place - and very welcoming it is too. Many of the cigars available are displayed on a back-wall rack of shelves. There's a few display cabinets here and there, containing one or two humidors and a small range of lighters, but not much in the way of other essential cigar accessories. On offer is a range of Cuban brands, and other non-Cuban brands e.g. *Nestor, Evilio, Tenorio, Arturo Fuente* etc. there is also a selection of small sized machine-made cigars. The big plus is that the price levels in this store are very reasonable - especially when you take into consideration its upmarket location. And when you do finally make a purchase, there's room enough to sit down and enjoy a very pleasant and relaxing puff. There's plenty of swank in this store, but none of the pretensions. Be sure to check it out.
